CLAIMS FOR INJURY

The Chase County Fair Association refuses to assume any liability for injury to the persons or any of the exhibitors or their officers or employees, or to any patrons or other persons coming upon the grounds of the Chase County Fair Association, and no claim for injury to any persons or property shall ever be asserted or suit instituted or maintained against the Chase County Fair Association, its officers, agents, representatives, servants or employees for said cause by any person having license or privilege to exhibit on the Fair Grounds, or occupying any space thereon, and it is a part of the consideration of such license or privilege that such claims for damage are specifically waived.

If any damage, loss or injury to person or property shall be approximately caused by reason of neglect or willful act of any person, firm, corporation, their agents or representatives, servants, or employees having license privilege to exhibit on said Fair Grounds or occupy space thereon, the Chase County Fair Association shall not in any manner be responsible therefore and in case it be subjected to any expense or liability all persons causing same are liable therefore and shall indemnify the Chase County Fair Association.

GENERAL FAIR POLICIES

1. The fair office is located in the Pendergraft building. The Community and Pendergraft buildings will be open at 8:00 a.m. each morning of the fair.
2. Superintendents are requested to report 30 minutes before their division exhibits are to be received and judged. See schedules on pages 1, 2 & 3. Questions about schedules must be directed to the Fair Secretary. All exhibits will be released Thursday at 11:00 a.m. Premium money may be withheld if exhibits are removed before 11:00 a.m. without Fair Board approval. Any exhibits left will be taken to the Fair Office area by 12:00 p.m.
3. **All judging schedules must start promptly.** Superintendents of each division may only change the judging schedule rotation. Superintendents will take the judges placings to the fair office promptly after results are recorded.
4. Meals during the fair will be served by the Faith Methodist Church in the Community building.
5. A concession stand or trailer will be operated on the grounds during the fair by a club or group approved by the fair board. Guidelines will be provided.
6. No Exhibitor shall sell, offer for sale, advertise or in any way use the articles so exhibited for his or her personal gain, until after all judging is finished, and then only by consent of the superintendent in charge who shall have received instructions from the Secretary.
7. No one shall be allowed to set up a booth, or display or engage in anything whatever for profit without first paying to the Secretary such a sum as the management of the Fair may determine and receive a permit signed by the Secretary.
8. While judges or awarding committees are acting, owners or those in charge will make no remarks except to answer questions asked by the judge or awarding committee.
9. The officers reserve the right, on account of rain, wind, or for any other reason, to call off the program for any day.

GENERAL RULES FOR EXHIBITORS

1. Competition is open to Chase County only.
2. Exhibitors must deliver their exhibits to the grounds to the Superintendent of their respective divisions who will direct their placing and arrangements on the grounds. The Board will use all due diligence in its power to assure the safety of all exhibits but in no case will the Association be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur. Exhibitors must give personal attention to their property and immediately after the close of the Fair, take charge of and remove the same. Exhibits released from 11:00 am to 12:00 pm Thursday.

4-H ENTRIES MUST BE MADE WITH THE EXTENSION OFFICE. THESE ENTRIES ARE DUE BY TUESDAY JULY 7, 2026. PREMIUMS WILL BE WITHHELD FROM LATE 4-H ENTRIES.

3. During the Fair, the office of the Secretary will be on the Fair grounds in the Pendergraft Building.
Open class entries may be submitted by Thursday, July 9 to the Extension Office. During fair week enter open class entries at the fair office located in the Pendergraft Building on the fairgrounds. Entry cards will be printed and available for pick up from the fair office. Entry cards must be submitted to the superintendent with the entry. Early entry is encouraged.
4. Should any individual enter any animal or article in any other name than that of the bona fide owner, or in any other way attempt to perpetuate a fraud on the Association, such person upon positive proof, shall not be allowed to compete or receive any premium that may have been awarded them.
5. All exhibits shall be under the control of the Association during the Fair, and not be removed from the grounds during the Fair without the consent or written permission of the President. Exhibitors violating this rule may forfeit any and all premiums that have been awarded to them. Duplicate of exhibit tag will have to be presented to the Superintendent before any exhibit can be removed.
6. Any exhibitor who shall tear off or cause to tear off, any premium card or ribbon in the presence of the judges, or shall otherwise insult the same, shall be excluded from all competition and said award or premium shall by these acts be deemed forfeited, and the Association shall be under no obligation to pay the same.
7. No person shall in any manner be allowed to interfere, either directly or indirectly with superintendents or judges in the discharge of their duties. Violation will result in forfeiture of premiums.
8. **Each exhibitor may enter two articles under each class except where stated under various classifications.**
9. Every article will be under the control of the Superintendent, and every possible care will be taken to prevent damage. But in no event will the Fair management be responsible for injury or loss that may occur.
10. Entries made in groups must be grown, made or produced by the same individual.
11. Judges and members of committees are kindly asked to acquaint themselves with rules of the Association relating to awards.
13. Persons making entries shall be furnished with a card to be placed on the animal or article to be exhibited, by which alone it will be known to the awarding committee.
14. No person except the Secretary will be allowed to examine the entry books until the awards have been made.

15. Members of awarding committees are asked to judge all animals or articles in the class they are passed on according to a certain standard made according to the rules of this Association, laid down in this instance regardless of any competition - as, for instance, should there be no competition in any one class or ring, they are to pass on the single animal or article and award a premium to their judgement. The rule of the Association is that: the lack of competition shall not bar anyone from premiums, but the article or animal shall not have a premium unless worthy of it.
16. Articles that make up a collection cannot be entered for separate premium or championship.
17. Persons exhibiting or directly interested in a class cannot act as judges in such class.
18. 4-H Divisions - In all classes except Beef & Dairy, Swine, Sheep, Goat & Horses, a ribbon denotes these awards only if worthy: Purple-Superior, Blue-Above average, Red-Average, White-Minimum standard. 4-H Livestock may be given these awards: 1st-Blue, 2nd-Red, 3rd-White, 4th-Pink, 5th-Yellow, 6th-Orange, All Others-Green. A purple ribbon in livestock class denotes Champion.
19. Open Class Divisions - A ribbon may be awarded to top 3 places in each class: 1st, 2nd, 3rd, only if judge deems worthy.
20. No animal can be shown in more than one class except as one of a pair, herd and in the sweepstakes.

APPEALS AND PROTESTS

1. The Executive Committee will consider all appeals duly filed in writing and will make known their decision after due consideration of the facts.
2. Protests against any award must be made in writing and verified by affidavit, if so requested. It must be filed with the Secretary before the close of the Fair, and must, in plain language, state the facts whereon such protest is made. Protests and answers, if any, will be considered by the Executive Committee immediately after the Fair and decision will be announced by the Secretary to both parties of the contest.
3. The management reserves the right to remove from the grounds any exhibit, animal, concession or show that may have been falsely entered, or may deem unsuitable or objectionable or to remove any sign, banner, identification mark or signature or advertising matter of any kind which may be deemed objectionable by them without giving reason therefore.

ANIMAL SHOW GENERAL RULES

1. Competition is open to Chase County only.
2. Exhibitors of livestock are required to keep their stalls in good order and their stock accessible to visitors at all reasonable hours of the day.
3. The Superintendent shall reject diseased livestock.
4. **Horse Show Divisions:** You must have a negative Coggins on each horse planning to show at the county fair. It must be current, which is within 12 months of the county fair date. (New KDA Regulation)
5. **Poultry Show Divisions:** A negative PT test is required for all birds (excluding waterfowl) coming to the fair.

It is urged that entries be made as early on Entry Day as possible to avoid last minute confusion.

- Alcohol is not allowed as an ingredient in food preservation entries. Entries with alcohol will be disqualified and not be judged.

- Each exhibit must have the complete recipe and instructions attached with the entry card, or it will be disqualified. Recipe must include exhibitor name, recipe source, date of publication, and elevation, where food was processed. If using Mrs. Wage's or Ball® mixes, indicate the date the mix was purchased.
- Exhibits must be heat processed in clean, clear standard canning jars, with new matching brand (ex: use Ball® lids on Ball® jars,) two-piece lids. This includes fermented foods. Do not use colored jars, fancy padded lids, fabric over wraps or cozies as they interfere with the judging process. Do not reuse jars from commercial food products (ex: spaghetti sauce jars). No fancy packs unless recipe states to do so (ex: Pickled asparagus). Jars must be sealed when entered. - A. Competition open to any club member of Chase County, whose records are complete and up to date.
- B. No exhibitor will be allowed to enter more than one exhibit in any class, except where so stated. A limit of four animals each in beef, swine, dairy, meat goats, and sheep will be accepted. Can enter two exhibits per class in Poultry and Rabbits. Sow and litter counts as one project.
- C. Club members will exhibit only those projects in which they are enrolled and must be current year's work.
- D. All Superintendents will receive Ribbons and instructions at the Fair Secretary's Office.
- E. All 4-H Club Exhibitors will give their entry tags to the various Superintendents who will place them on their entries.
- F. All Superintendents will return their Judge's Placings to the office of the Secretary after judging in their department is finished.
- G. All exhibits will be released Thursday at 11:00 a.m. Premium money may be withheld if exhibits are removed before 11 am without Fair Board approval.
- H. **Each exhibitor is responsible for cleaning his/her stalls/pens at close of Fair. Failure to do so may cause forfeit of premiums.**
- I. 4-H Livestock Auction will be held at 4:30 p.m. on Thursday.
- J. **Exhibitors not ready when class is called or entries not labeled properly or not entered on time will forfeit premium.**
- K. The showing of all species of livestock will be a **No-Fit Show, except horses.** "No Fit" is defined as using no adhesive, glue, paint, oil, polish or powder products. **Water only** is acceptable for fitting. Animals may be clipped, blown, brushed, or combed to enhance their appearance. **This rule applies to the livestock shows and the Stanley Stout Memorial 4-H Auction.**
- L. Dress Code: Livestock exhibitors should dress with pride in species appropriate clothing. T-shirts, tennis shoes, sandals, flip flops and ball caps are not allowed while showing or in sale ring.

M. *Asterisk before class number indicates that project is eligible for State Fair Exhibit.

N. Minimum Weight Policy-

- All mkt. beef, hogs, goats and lambs must meet the minimum weight requirements to be eligible to sell at the livestock auction. Mkt. Beef (1,100 lbs.), Hogs (220 lbs.), Lambs (100 lbs.), and Market Goats (50 lbs.). Animals that don't make the minimum weight will show in an underweight class and will not be eligible to show for Grand or Reserve Grand Champion in market hog, lamb, meat goat, and beef classes.
- O. If a market animal weighs under the minimum required weight, they will be allowed to have one more weigh in before the close of the weigh in time. They cannot leave the premises during this time. If anyone is caught adding weight in an inappropriate manner, they will be disqualified from showing.

- S. **No waddle swine breeds will be accepted by the floor buyer. Families can still show them and take them through the premium sale.**

4-H DIVISION A: AEROSPACE/ROCKETRY

Jennifer Stout & Jerry Stout, Superintendents

- 4-H'er must be enrolled in the phase to exhibit in this division.
- If a fire "burn ban" is in effect for any county in Kansas, exhibitors in any Kansas County are not required to launch their rocket(s). All requirements for the launching of rockets for the fair and the documenting of the launching are suspended for the duration of the ban.
- The report that accompanies the rocket must be limited to the 4-H Rocket Exhibit Information Form which is affixed to a 10"x13" envelope. This form may be found online or at the local Extension Office. This envelope should **NOT** be attached to the rocket stand or rocket. Any rocket exhibit not including this completed envelope will be displayed but not judged.
- Rockets are to be properly assembled according to the assembly instructions.
- Angles of fins must fall within a plus or minus 2 degree variation using an approved fin alignment guide (such as KSSTAC10).
- No engines are permitted with the exhibit. (Spent engines with no nozzle or propellant are permitted).
- **See State Fair Handbook for a more detailed list of exhibit definitions, information and rules.**
- **May enter 1 rocket per class with a total of 2 per division.**

4-H DIVISION B: AG MECHANICS (Welding)

Jennifer Stout & Jerry Stout, Superintendents

- Each exhibitor is required to complete the “4-H Mechanics Welding Exhibit Information Form” for each exhibit, which is available at the Extension Office. This form must be attached to a 10”x13” manila envelope. Do not attach the envelope to the exhibit.
- Include in the envelope a bill of materials for the project with associated cost, list items that were free at a \$0 cost. 1 to 5 pages of photos showing work on the exhibit; from beginning to end stages. If appropriate schematics or working drawings. If appropriate operating instructions.
- Top heavy items should be braced or placed in a stand sufficient to prevent them from toppling over while on display.
- No sealed vessels are allowed. All vessels must be properly vented, for example, a water tank with a fill cap, or a drilled hole for empty chambers that allows pressure to equalize. Exhibits not properly vented will be disqualified.
- Tanks are to be triple rinsed, dried and free of all liquid residue.
- As exhibitors build their exhibits, appropriate PPE (Personal Protection Equipment) is required.
- Cutting surfaces, such as blades, are to have a protective covering over them to prevent injury. The covering should be easily removed and reinstalled for judging. Foam “pool noodles” and multiple layers of cardboard are acceptable.
- If the exhibit is powered by flammable liquids (gas, propane, kerosene, etc.) the fuel tank and fuel system should be drained and allowed to dry, to avoid spills and potential fires.
- Electric powered (battery, corded, solar, or alternative energy) exhibits should have a primary shutoff or disconnect switch.
- Wheeled exhibits must utilize a braking mechanism which prevents the exhibit from freely rolling while on display.
- Exhibitors are responsible for providing sufficient braking or “chocks” for trailer or wheeled exhibits to ensure that the exhibits do not move once positioned.
- Exhibits with downward swinging parts, such as tailgates, that could pose a fall/striking/crushing hazard should have a tamper resistant locking mechanism such as a “zip-tie” or a “cotter-key” through a release pin that would prevent the swinging part from being accidentally released and falling on someone.

4-H DIVISION E: BUILDING BLOCK ENGINEERING

- 4-H members must be currently enrolled in the Building Block Engineering project to exhibit in this division.
- Exhibitors are limited to one exhibit.
- Total exhibit dimensions may not exceed 2 feet high, by 2 feet wide, by 2 feet deep. The minimum exhibit dimensions must be at least 6 inches wide and deep.
- All exhibits are required to be placed in a sturdy see-through enclosure with a top, bottom, and 4 sides. A 'clear' tub turned upside down with the exhibit placed on the lid would be an acceptable enclosure. Cases are to be removable and should not be bolted down, glued, or sealed in any way that prevents judges from touching the actual display. (Locking handles and snap shut lids are fine.)
- Weapons are not prohibited in dioramas. Scenes depicting battles, like you would find in museums, are acceptable exhibits. However, blood and "gore" is not to be added and will result in a ribbon place deduction.
- Each exhibitor is required to complete the "4-H Building Block Engineering Exhibit Information Form" which is available at the Extension Office. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10"x13" manila envelope. Do not tie the envelope to the exhibit.
- Each exhibit information packet should include the following items: 1 to 5 pages of photos showing work on the exhibit, preferably from a beginning state to final or completed state.
- All components used in construction should be dust and hair free, clean, free of chips, scuffs, cracks, or broken blocks.
- Gaps or cracks should not be visible between assembled blocks unless they fit with the story, for example an earthquake.
- The primary building component should be interlocking blocks, commonly referred to by the brand name of Lego®.
- Other components can be integrated into dioramas to illustrate architectural aspects that may be difficult to convey with traditional interlocking blocks, for example marbles for small round objects.
- Vehicles that are intended to stay in a single place should be affixed to base plates with sticky tack, hot glue, or other method.
- Mechanical enhancements or motion elements that add motion to the diorama are acceptable and encouraged. For example, merry-go-rounds, doors, elevators, gears, marbles going down a channel, flapping wings, animatronics, etc. If included judges should be able to use them and instructions should be provided for operation either in the story or on a separate page.
- Artistic designs, for example recreating paintings like the "Mona Lisa" or "Starry Nights" and structures like "David" are not permitted as exhibits and one ribbon placing should be deducted. These exhibits should be displayed in Visual Arts.

- F. Recycled sewing project - an item made of at least 50% recycled material (recycled means reusing/remodeling an existing item in a different way. Could be remaking/redesigning a garment, re-purposing a clothing item for a new use either wearable or household. Must include sewing for all or part.) **A 4X6 card** must be attached to the entry describing the recycled materials and how they were used.
- G. Any garments made for another may be modeled for exhibition only in the public fashion revue.
- H. Fashion Revue judging is entered separately.
- I. An asterisk (*) before the class indicates eligible for State Fair for 4-H age 9 and older.
- J. Educational Exhibits: May enter one of the following; Flat Posters (not smaller than 18" x 22" or larger than 22" x 28"), Tri-Fold display board, or Notebook. Clearly label with name, club, phase of project.
- K. 4-H'er must participate in consultation judging to be eligible for champion awards in Sewing & Textile Design.

An exhibitor may enter up to three items in this division, but only one article per class.

- Each Electronics & Renewable Energy exhibit must include a "4-H Electronics & Renewable Energy Information Form" which is available through the Extension Office. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10"x13" manila envelope. You must also include a wiring diagram or schematic. Place them inside the manila envelope. For notebooks, display boards, and posters, no additional exhibit information is required; no manila envelope is needed for these exhibits. A sheet of operating instructions must be furnished and included in the manila envelope for any exhibit not self-explanatory.
- Items that have been in use should be cleaned for exhibit.
- Classes 1-3 must be operable using only 110 or 120V AC or battery power. If battery power is required, batteries must be furnished.
- Any project with a complexity of size or electronics must have (a) instructions for assembly and use and (b) equipment available at the time of judging for actual testing of the exhibit.
- No hand dipped solder may be used on exhibits.
- All electrical exhibits' wiring and connections must be accessible for examination by the judges. Sealed exhibits that cannot be opened for inspection are not acceptable.
- Lithium batteries must be accessible or removeable in exhibits for safety purposes. The exhibit cannot contain a locked compartment housing a lithium battery.
- The National Electric Code (NEC) will apply for judging.

Displays should show either a fully functional computer or show what the individual components do. The display should be free of dust and cabled neatly. Fully functional computers should boot up and do not need to include a monitor, keyboard, or mouse.
- *5. EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY: Create on a tri-fold board no bigger than a 3'x4'. The display will illustrate one basic idea and does not include a power source.

ALTERNATIVE ENERGY-A form of energy derived from natural source, such as the sun, geothermal, wind, tides or waves.

All exhibits in this phase are limited in size to standard, tri-fold, display boards (36"x48") and items may not extend beyond 12" from the back board. All displays must be self-standing.

- *6. EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY Create an exhibit that addresses a focused topic related to power generated from a renewable energy source. The purpose of the exhibit is to inform and create awareness.
- *7. EXPERIMENT-Display an experiment addressing a problem or question related to power generated from a renewable energy source. Include hypothesis, background research, variables, a control, data, findings, conclusions and recommendations for future study.

4-H DIVISION J: ENTOMOLOGY

Jennifer Stout & Jerry Stout, Superintendents

County projects may be fulfilled by entering Class #1 (not eligible for state fair). **Please see the State Fair Book for detailed Insect Collection Rules, Notebook Rules and Educational Display Rules.**

- All entries should be submitted in an 18 x 24 x 3.5-inch wooden display box with a clear plastic top (such as Plexiglas). Boxes can be handmade or purchased as long as they are of the correct size.
- The specimens should be collected by the exhibitor and should focus on Kansas insects. Insects may be collected from one county into bordering states and labeled accordingly. Please refer to "Entomology Collection Exhibit Resource" for full details on out-of-state insects in collections.
- Only specimens of the class Insecta should be included.
- Purchased insects are not to be exhibited in collections, but they may be used in educational displays.
- Specimens of soft bodied insects such as aphids, lice, termites, etc. should be exhibited in alcohol filled vials; however, the use of alcohol filled vials should be limited to only those specimens that lose their shape when pinned, since the vials pose a significant hazard to the rest of the collection if they become loose in transit.
- After the first year in Entomology, all 4-H members need to add an 8 ½ by 11-inch sheet of paper to their collection that states what they did to improve their collection for the current year. This should include how many new insects were added to the display box (please list), how many insects were replaced in the display box (please list), and number of new orders and/or families were added to the display box. Other optional things that could be included are number of insects caught for the year, number of new orders added this year, number of talks and/or demonstrations given, activities participated in, leadership roles, etc. This paper should be taped to the upper left corner on the front of your display box.
- The following insects are listed as Threatened or Endangered by the Fish and Wildlife Service. Because of this, no specimens of the below species may be caught or displayed in insect collections or educational displays. Please refer to www.kansas4-h.org on the Entomology project page for more information.
 - **American Burying Beetle** (*Nicrophorus americanus*)
 - **Monarch Butterfly** (*Danaus plexippus*)
 - **Eastern Regal Fritillary Butterfly** (*Argynnis idalia idalia* or *Speyeria idalia*)
 - **Western Regal Fritillary Butterfly** (*Argynnis idalia occidentalis* or *Speyeria occidentalis*)
 - **Great Spangled Fritillary** (*Speyeria cybele*)
- A minimum of 10 new specimens must be added and/or replaced each year.
- Do not put the spindle-shaped bag of a Bagworm in your collections (as a female example of the species.) These bags must be cut open to determine if the caterpillar inside is a male or female. Opening the box to confirm the ID correctness could pose a significant risk to the collection.

- Food Exhibits must be prepared in standard size pans, removed and displayed on plates or cardboard to fit the exhibit. Pies must be in disposable pans. All unfrosted cakes will be exhibited in an upright position with top crust showing except Bundt Cakes. All food entries must be in plastic bags.
- Labels: Foods exhibit - attach label to the bottom of your exhibit. Educational Exhibits - **label** - list name, club and phase of project. (On Posters, place on the back, lower, left side. On notebooks, place on bottom of front cover. On Table Top exhibit, attach with fair exhibit tag securely with string to information portion of exhibit.)
- Educational Exhibits may enter one: Flat Poster; (not smaller than 18" x 22" or larger than 22" x 28"), Tri Fold Display Board or Notebook.

- F. **Recipe cards are required on all food exhibits.** Tape to top of exhibit.
- G. Entries receiving a purple ribbon are eligible for State Fair (4-H age 9 and older).
- H. 4-H'er must participate in consultation judging to be eligible for champion awards.
- I. **For food safety purposes, any entries with frostings and fillings must calculate the amount of sugar in the frosting/filling recipe only.** Calculation must be attached to entry, or the placing will be lowered one ribbon when judged. Frosting and fillings need to contain more than 65% sugar for safety. Examples on how to calculate this percentage are included in the publication located at: <https://bookstore.ksre.ksu.edu/pubs/MF3544.pdf> A worksheet is available at: https://bookstore.ksre.ksu.edu/item/frostings-and-fillings-worksheet_4H1171 An exception is German Chocolate Cake frosting, they are safe at room temperature.
- J. For food safety purposes, any food with custard and dairy-based fillings and frostings (ex. Cream cheese regardless of sugar content) raw eggs, flavored oils, "canned" bread or cakes in a jar, cut fresh fruit or any food requiring refrigeration (ex. Bacon) or unbaked exhibit with raw flour (ex. No bake cookies) will be disqualified and not judged.
- K. Alcohol (ex. Wine, beer and hard liquor) is not allowed as an ingredient in food entries. Entries with alcohol will be disqualified and not be judged.
- L. All baked goods must be left whole and uncut. Small items, such as cookies and rolls, should be the same shape and from the same recipe. Exhibit 3 cookies, 3 muffins, 3 bread sticks, 1 loaf bread, etc.
- M. All un-frosted cakes should be exhibited in an upright position with crust showing. The exception is for cakes made with special designs such as Bundt cakes. They should have top crust side down.

(no more than one page 8 1/2 x 11). Boards must be on foam core or a standard tri-fold display.
- *2 - **Two Collages on Design Board:** In this project, develop two imaginary interior rooms. Each room should start out with identical dimensions and features (doors, windows, etc.) The function of the room can be up to you, but should be the same for both rooms. Each collage must be on its own page. Page size preference and maximum is 11 x 17; can use smaller dimensions if needed. For each collage, write a brief description of your design intent (one to three paragraphs total). Adhere both collages and design intent on a foam core presentation board. Label each collage with the descriptive words you selected from the list.
- *3 - **Two Diorama Models:** Construct two dioramas, one for each space demonstrating contrasting moods. Each diorama will be designed within similar sized boxes. Boxes should be large enough to be easily viewed but no larger than 12" x 18". Both rooms being depicted need to be the same size. Dioramas should not contain actual figures, miniature furniture/cabinets or moveable parts. All elements should be paper adhered to materials easily found at home.
- *4 - **Marble Maze or Enclosure:** Create a space in which a marble will move through a sequence of rooms, enclosures or spaces. To construct the marble maze or enclosure, use household materials found around the home to create the structure. (cardboard, chipboard, construction paper, paper towel or toilet paper tubes, etc.). The base of the structure should be no larger than 18" x 24" (poster board size) and 12" in height. In addition to your enclosure/maze, you may also present a small design board with illustrations/drawings to help the audience understand the path of travel for the marble, or the rules for which you designed. Write or type a brief description of your design intent (1-3 paragraphs total) to be included on the design board.
- *5 - **Marble Maze Presentation Board Only:** Presentation board should be foam core with below items attached: Include drawings of your marble enclosure/maze design; (examples include floor plan, section, elevations, etc.) In addition to your base drawings, include any illustrations/drawings to help your audience understand the path of travel for the marble. You may also include quality photographs that show the sequence of the marble moving through the built design. Images may be annotated, meaning you can use notes to explain your thoughts/design intent, on the board. This sequence of photos should visually tell the story of your design. Write or type a brief description of your design intent (1-3 paragraphs in total) to be included on the presentation board.

Photo's must be mounted across the 11" Vertical dimension of the 11" x 12.5" matte, 1" from the top and equal on both sides. Photos must not be larger than 8" x 10" or smaller than 7" x 9" with white borders removed. A permanent mount must be made using photo spray adhesive. **Do not use household glues, glue sticks, double stick tape/patches, etc. to adhere photo to matte board.**
- C. Date and time imprints should be avoided.
- D. Attach the label provided by the Extension office on the bottom of the matte. Only the ID strip should have lettering on it.
- E. Photographs taken with a digital camera are allowed no more adjustments than exposure, color intensity or correction, one click filter effects, red eye removal, cropping, dodging and burning, and HDR (high dynamic range). **Please note: AI (artificial intelligence) modified images are not allowed.**
- F. The black and white classes are for black and white photos only. Monochromatic prints, including sepia prints are considered color photos and must be entered in the appropriate color photo class.
- G. Improperly mounted photos, oversize or undersize photos or photos with the white borders not removed or lettering on the photo, will be awarded a ribbon one placing lower than the placing determined by the official judge.
- H. Appropriate photo subject matter: Photographic subject matter is expected to follow 4-H standards. For a sense of prohibited subject matter, review the Kansas 4-H member Code of Conduct; in general, if it is not allowable at a 4-H event, it is not allowable in a 4-H photograph at the County Fair.
- I. Photos with live subject(s) on railroad right of way or taken from railroad right of way property will not be judged nor displayed.
- J. Copyright protections must be observed.
- K. 4-Her must participate in consultation judging to be eligible for champion awards.
- L. **Do Not write anything on the back. Leave the back blank.**

4-H DIVISION Y: ROBOTICS

- Each exhibit must include a robot, information packets are not a sufficient exhibit.
- Robots must have automated (electric, pneumatic, hydraulic, etc.) articulated structures (arms, wheels, grippers, pneumatic, hydraulic, etc.). Game consoles that display on a screen are not considered robots and should either be entered in the computer sciences division or electronics and renewable energy division. Robots requiring no assembly, just programming, such as Ozobots, are considered computer sciences projects as the skill is focused on programming not on the construction of the robot.
- Robot dimensions should not exceed 2 feet high, by 2 feet wide, by 2 feet deep.
- Each exhibitor is required to fill out the "4-H Robotics Exhibit Information Form" which is available at the Extension Office. It must be attached to the outside of a 10" x 13" manila envelope.
- Materials including but not limited to obstacles, spare batteries, and mats for testing the robot may be placed in a separate container, which is not included in the robots' dimensions, that container may not be larger than 576 cubic inches as measured along the outside of the container.
- Please review the Robotics section in the State Fair Book for further guidelines and rules.

- National Minimum Standards and Best Practices <https://4-hshootingports.org/wp-content/uploads/2024/01/12.13.23-Minimum-Standards-Update.pdf> MUST be followed as well as Kansas 4-H Shooting Sports Handbook. https://bookstore.ksre.ksu.edu/pubs/kansas-4-h-shooting-sports-handbook_4H1101.pdf Exhibits outside these standards will be disqualified.
- Educational Display: must be the standard tri-fold board **ONLY**, must not exceed standard tri-fold: 3'x4' unless there is a topper that sits on top of the board; content not to exceed display board borders.
- Maximum exhibit size for all exhibits in this division is 4'X6'.
- Promotional Posters: must be flat and no larger than 22" x 30"; content not to exceed display board borders.
- Notebooks: no larger than 8 ½" x 11".
- Exhibits must not display, describe, or depict firearms or firearm components that are not allowed by 4-H Shooting Sports National Minimum Standards.
- Exhibitors must comply with state and federal laws.
- No "live" ammunition containing propellant or explosive powders may be used in any display. An inert substitution must be used in lieu of powder and "live" ammunition, the substitution must be clearly described on the back of the poster, display or in a notebook.
- Name, county or district, age and year in project should be on the front of the poster, display or notebook unless special arrangements are made because of declination of publicity release.
- Exhibits will not be accepted if they are related to reloads.

- *6. Storage Case** - Any item the 4-H member makes with the purpose to safely hold a firearm, bow, ammunition, and/or arrows. Examples: soft sided shotgun case, quivers, firearm safe, include your design, or plans you adapted. Explain how the storage case is used.
- *7. Practice Game or Activity** - Invent or adapt an activity to practice or teach a project skill. Include pictures of youth playing the game, testimonials of 4-H members who played the game, what skill is being worked on, and directions for the game. Explain how you came up with the game or adapted it to fit the needs of your group members.

4-H DIVISION ZC: SMALL ENGINE

Jennifer Stout & Jerry Stout, Superintendents

- **Exhibitors may enter 1 per class up to 3 in the division.**
- All exhibits should involve engines smaller than 25 horsepower. Engine should have no fuel in tank or carburetor.
- Each Small Engines exhibit must include a "4-H Small Engines Information Form", which is available through the Extension Office. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10' X 13" manila envelope. Place them inside the manila envelope. For notebooks, display boards, and posters, no additional exhibit information is required; no manila envelope is needed for these exhibits.
- Items that have been in use should be cleaned for exhibit.
- A sheet of operating instructions must be included in the packet for any exhibit that is not self-explanatory.
- As exhibitors prepare their exhibits, appropriate PPE (Personal Protection Equipment) is required.
- Cutting surfaces, such as blades, are to have a protective covering over them to prevent injury. The covering should be easily removed and reinstalled for judging. Foam "pool noodles" and multiple layers of cardboard are acceptable.
- If a safety violation is noted by the judges, superintendent, or other staff, the exhibitor's exhibit, at the judges' discretion, may receive reduced ribbon placement or disqualification.
- Maximum tri-fold size is 3'x4' - for Display & Maintenance Classes

- ***2. Maintenance:** Exhibit a display that illustrates either: 1) Routine maintenance procedures OR 2) Diagnosing and troubleshooting specific problems in an engine. No complete engines, lawn tractors, tillers, chainsaws, etc. are permitted for display
- ***3. Operation:** Exhibit an operable small engine (no more than 20 HP) overhauled or rebuilt by the member. Include maintenance schedule for the engine and a brief description of steps taken by the member overhauling or rebuilding the engine.

- Telescopes are limited to no more than six feet in length. They must be placed on a stationary stand that does not allow the telescope to roll and/or fall over. The stand cannot extend past two feet in length or width.
- For scratch built UAS kits, if modifications are made to the exhibit, a page should be attached noting those modifications.
- For practical application entries, the UAS is not required to be displayed as part of the exhibit, only the supporting material.

- *4. Uncrewed Aircraft System designed and constructed by exhibitor that is operated by a remote-controlled device. The UAS must not be a mere modification of an existing kit or plan. You may not exhibit a UAS that is purchased off the shelf in this class.
- *5. Practical application of an Uncrewed Aircraft System constructed from a commercial (purchased) kit. This includes one or more of the following: video, notebook, poster, display board, etc. This class is separate from educational exhibits. A tangible use would be mapping Russian olive trees, eroded soils, and bindweed in fields, etc. There are also many other non-agricultural UAS uses that would be appropriate for this class.
- *6. Educational Exhibit (poster, tri-fold, notebook) see State Fair Handbook for specifics

4-H DIVISION ZF: VETERINARY SCIENCE

Janet Ayers & Melinda Hinkson, Superintendents

4-H members may exhibit a maximum of one exhibit in this division

- A Veterinary Science exhibit may consist of a poster, notebook, project display or diorama. The exhibit may represent material from any of the Veterinary Science projects including entry level exhibits from Unit I.
- If photographs are to be part of the exhibit, remember that they will be viewed by the public. Make sure that the photographs are in good taste and will not be offensive to anyone.
- First-Aid Kits: Because of public safety concerns and risk of theft of first-aid kit contents (veterinary drugs/equipment) they are to not be displayed. First Aid kits wishing to include medication information should instead utilize written descriptions, photographs, drawings, computer generated print-outs or empty packaging of pharmaceuticals.
- Because these are science displays, all references and information must be properly cited.
- The Veterinary Science Modules are for sourcing, referencing, and learning purposes. The modules are not for project submission. Any notebooks, posters, displays, or dioramas submitted with only Veterinary Science Modules work will be disqualified.

- 4-H'er must participate in consultation judging to be eligible for Champion awards.
- All exhibits that need to be hung **must have a wire or sawtooth hanger attached.**
- One entry will be selected for exhibit at the State Fair from 4- H age 9 and older from each class.
- Articles exhibited must be an original design created by the exhibitor.
- No plants or plant materials needing watering can be entered as an art display or item.
- **May enter 2 entries per class / Only 4 in Division**

CLASS

1. **Fine Arts** - Oil, chalk, charcoal, dyes, pastels, pencil, ink, acrylic, or watercolor on canvas, canvas board, paper, wood, metal, or textiles, framed as a picture, prepared for hanging. Stretched canvas art on a wooden frame is considered prepared for hanging provided that frame has a hanger.
2. **Clay and Ceramics** - Any original item made of clay; may be fired or unfired, hand formed, or thrown on a wheel. Self-hardening, fire/oven-cured, and/or cornstarch, clays are acceptable. Items can include, but are not limited to, clay statues, bowls, etc.
3. **Leather and Jewelry** - Any leather stamping, carving, tooling, lacing, or stitching piece or any jewelry piece made from any medium are acceptable exhibits. Leather project kits are acceptable due to leather being pre-cut for particular projects. If a 4-H member makes their own leather pattern that should be explained in the rubric and the pattern included.
4. **Three-Dimensional** - The piece must be observable on at least three sides and should be either free-standing or prepared to be hung. Craft and pre-formed or assembled projects are not acceptable.
5. **General Crafts** - This category incorporates miscellaneous pieces that do not correspond to the four, above-mentioned categories.

4-H DIVISION ZH: WILDLIFE

Janet Ayers & Melinda Hinkson, Superintendents

May enter 1 entry per class

Exhibitors must comply with state and federal laws. It is illegal to possess threatened or endangered wildlife, or the feathers, nests, or eggs of non-game birds. Game birds and game animals taken legally during open season may be used. Every wildlife on display must have a statement about how they were obtained legally. The use of live wild animals in educational exhibits is prohibited.

- Exhibits must not display, describe, or depict firearms or firearm components that are not allowed by 4-H Shooting Sports National Minimum Standards.

4-H DIVISION ZH: WILDLIFE CONTINUED

- Wildlife exhibits that reflect harvesting of wildlife must follow National Minimum Standards and Best Practices and Kansas 4-H Shooting Sports Handbook and Kansas Fish and Game laws. Exhibits outside these standards will be disqualified.
- No “live” ammunition containing propellant or explosive powders may be used in any display. An inert substitution must be used in lieu of powder and “live” ammunition, the substitution must be clearly described on the back of the poster, display or in a notebook.
- Exhibit topics regarding firearm care, handling, and shooting will only be accepted from Extension Units with 4-H Certified Shooting Sports Programs and enrolled 4-H youth in the specific Shooting Sports Project.
- Exhibits will not be accepted if they are related to reloads.
- Taxidermy: The exhibitor is responsible for following all laws, rules, and regulations, and when licenses, tags, etc. are required, to include those and/or the information required with the exhibit. For taxidermy please reference hunting and furbearer laws for Kansas. <https://ksoutdoors.gov/Hunting/Hunting-Regulations/Furbearers>
- Refer to the State Fair Handbook for the specifics for the displays, notebooks and posters.

4-H DIVISION ZI: WOOD-WORKING

Each exhibitor is limited to one exhibit in this division.

- Projects that have unsecured glass, i.e., glass shelves, the glass top of a coffee table, etc., should not be brought to the fair. Glass that is secured in the project, i.e., the glass front of a gun case or cabinet, etc., is permissible since it cannot be easily removed.
- The plan from which the project was constructed **must** be included with the article exhibited. The plan may be a photocopy, the actual pattern, or a scale drawing. It must be complete and accurate to the extent that a duplicate article could be built using the plan as a guide. Please note: a set of step-by-step instructions is not a plan.
- The use of materials other than wood, screws, nails, and adhesive should be kept to a minimum.
- Extra pieces that go with your woodworking project (i.e. bean bags to go with a cornhole set, building blocks to go with a play table, etc) **SHOULD NOT** be submitted with the project.
- The entry card, plans and all other paperwork should be enclosed in a zip top plastic bag with a hole punched through it and tied or otherwise secured to the project in some manner. Tape is usually not adequate to accomplish this.
- Refinished/repared furniture should be exhibited in Interior Design & Architecture Class.
- Projects made from pre-cut kits are not allowed.
- Firearms and weapons are not to be entered or exhibited

4-H DIVISION ZI: WOOD-WORKING CONTINUED

- **Projects with “fractal burning” are NOT ALLOWED in any Exhibits (Example – electrical burning to make black linework on artwork.)**
- During construction of exhibits, PPE (personal protective equipment) is to be worn by those in the workspace.

- Each exhibitor will be judged by the Specie Judge during the showmanship class during the specie show and placed for awards. The top two showman from each specie will advance to the finals; held Wednesday afternoon at 2:00 pm.
- The showing of all species of livestock will be a No-Fit-Show, **except horses**. “No Fit” is defined as using no adhesive, glue, paint, oil, polish or powder products. **Water only** is acceptable for fitting.
- All youth who qualify to show in the Round Robin must be able to show all species of animals which include: horse, swine, sheep, goat and beef. A youth who is uncomfortable with showing all these species can pass and the opportunity will go to the next youth who qualified. Once the show order and animal selection is completed there will be no changes.
- **Species for Finals are: Beef, Sheep, Swine, Meat Goat & Horse**
- Classes for entry in Showmanship can be found in each species division of the fair book. Please refer to that division for entry.
